



Every physiotherapist who practices in Manitoba must be a registered member of the College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba (CPM).

CPM is a self-supported professional body that regulates the practice of physiotherapy in Manitoba. CPM receives its regulatory authority from *The Physiotherapists Act* of Manitoba (2001).

CPM is responsible for:

- Setting standards of practice
- Registering only qualified physiotherapists who wish to practice in Manitoba
- Ensuring that complaints of malpractice, misconduct or incompetence involving physiotherapists are thoroughly investigated and that appropriate action is taken
- Maintaining a Continuing Competency Program that requires members to demonstrate that they have engaged in activities to maintain and enhance their ability to practice

COUNCIL CHAIR'S MESSAGE

As I began preparation of the 2017 Council Report, I was reminded that this marked 60 years since the enactment of the "Act Respecting the Practice of Physiotherapy" giving regulatory authority to the newly formed Association of Physiotherapists of Manitoba. As a former recipient of the Leonore Saunders award, I felt there was no better time to remember her contributions to our profession. Leonore came to Canada in 1949 from Manchester, England, with her diploma in physical therapy and is credited with assisting with the legal process of having physical therapy become a certified occupation in Manitoba in 1957 in addition to spearheading the development of the School of Medical Rehabilitation in 1960. Many things have changed since Leonore served as the first Registering Secretary of what we now refer to as the College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba/CPM, from 1957 to 1962.

As I reflect on the variety of issues that have come before Council in the last year, it reminds me of the evolution of our profession and how much the role of the College has also grown over the last 6 decades. I don't think our predecessors could have envisioned the impact technology and innovation would have on the delivery and scope of physiotherapy services or the challenges CPM would address in order to keep up its mandate to protect the public in a changing world and changing face of health care while continuing to honour the foundation of our profession. The advent of social media, the evolution of treatment techniques and creation of new ones, the utilization of telehealth and tele-rehabilitation, the changing requirements related to continuing competency and the expansion of roles for physiotherapists in areas such a primary care are just a few of the issues that have impacted and influenced the work of CPM. We have worked together with our members and stakeholders through the reduction in publicly funded outpatient physiotherapy services within the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority and have ongoing work with government and other regulatory bodies to prepare for the Regulated Health Professions Act and how it will impact how we all work together. Through it all, CPM has had the opportunity to strengthen our working relationships with the Manitoba Physiotherapy Association and the College of Rehabilitation Sciences as we continue to address the impact on the public and access to physiotherapy services.

I would like to take this opportunity to not only remember those that came before us and helped lay the foundation of Physiotherapy in Manitoba, but also thank the current members of Council and numerous volunteers on CPM committees that have worked tirelessly to support the work of CPM in these changing times. "The only way to make sense out of change is to plunge into it, move with it, and join the dance." —Alan W. Watts

STRATEGIC DIRECTION 2017

The year 2017 represented the profession's sixtieth anniversary of being a self-regulated profession. The Association of Physiotherapists of Manitoba began in 1957 due to the foresight of early members of the profession, many of whom were remedial gymnasts. As you read this Annual Report from the College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba, which is the newer name of the organization (2001), you will see references to things from the past.

The work of the College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba centres around four main strategic areas of focus:

- 1. Enhancing mandated processes.
- 2. Building and nurturing relationships.
- 3. Strengthening governance practices of the organization.
- 4. Influencing and implementing new legislation.

In addition, the College has developed an operational plan that fortifies the work of the strategic plan. A review of both the Strategic and Operational plans occurs throughout the year to evaluate CPM's achievements in meeting the plan in a timely manner.

In addition to the work of College staff, activities of the College are accomplished through a volunteer Council who provide strategic direction and policy for the organization. As well, there are hardworking committee volunteers who dedicate their time, talent and expertise to the activities of the College. Without commitment from our registrants to participate in Council and Committee activities, CPM would have difficulty in maintaining our self-regulatory status. Our volunteers provide input into the direction of the profession and assist the College in developing standards of practice and registration, overseeing the Code of Ethics and other activities.

In the past year, the CPM Committees have been working diligently to accomplish a long list of activities:

The Continuing Competence Program has continued to ask members to set goals, or review and report on goals from the previous year. The Practice Audit component selects a number of registrants for a review by a Practice Auditor. Evidence to date indicates that the majority of our registrants are excellent practitioners. A Jurisprudence module has been developed in partnership with several other Manitoba professions and has been pilot tested in 2017. This module is based on the *Regulated Health Profession Act* and is educational with respect to the changes that this new legislation will bring forth. CPM has taken a leadership role in the development of this module.

CPM was also involved in a Jurisprudence Exam project by invitation from Physiotherapy Alberta. This project began in 2016 and concluded in 2017. It follows on the completion and approval of the Core Standards of Physiotherapy Practice. Through our work on this project, CPM has access to 130 plus questions and case studies in a multiple choice format based on the harmonized standards of practice accepted by most Canadian jurisdictions. CPM will now determine the best use of these questions going forward.

The Complaints Committee was forced to take a five month hiatus from its work in 2017 following the expiration of the terms of office for all public member appointments and a delay in new appointments. The Committee was unable to pass any motions without the participation of at least one third public members on the committee. Once the appointments were made, the committee was very busy dealing with the backlog of complaints.

The Physiotherapy Standards Committee, with the hiring of Shauna Martin as CPM's Policy Writer, has changed its function from writing policy to serving in an advisory capacity to the Policy Writer. Over the past year, it was decided that documents called Position Statements or Policy and Practice Statements would become Practice Directions, which is in compliance with the requirements of the *Regulated Health Professions Act*. A number of Practice Directives were reviewed, a new template developed and the contents reviewed to simplify the Direction. Visit the CPM website to see the changes made to the Policies and Directions of the College.

The Board of Assessors, which is the committee concerned with registration of members, has had a busy year with Examination Candidates who have failed the OSCE component of the Physiotherapy Competency Examination more than once. Initially the Board had processes in place to interview and enhance the Examination Candidate's ability to pass the PCE. However, when registrants failed the exam more than once, the Board decided that their efforts were not assisting the Examination Candidates and the process was disbanded. In addition, the Board felt that Examination Candidates who had not completed the PCE should not be registered to practice higher risk activities such as those that will be considered "reserved acts" in the new legislation. Therefore, the Board recommended to Council that a policy should be in place and a condition be placed on their registration that they cannot practice a high risk, reserved act. Examples of this include: acupuncture, pelvic floor treatment and high cervical manipulation.

The Legislative Committee is moving into high gear to work on Regulations for the Regulated Health Profession Act (RHPA). The College has had several meetings with the Legislative Unit of Manitoba Health in 2017 to ensure that we are on task to come under the RHPA.

The Ethics Committee has spent considerable time developing educational tools for the membership. They have developed an educational program about ethical considerations. They ran a survey late in 2017 asking members to respond to ethical questions which required some critical thinking about ethical issues. They completed the year by doing a comparison of the current CPM Code of Ethics and the new Harmonized Code.

The Governance and Nomination Committee (GNC) is a committee of the Council which reviews and updates governance policy for the College and seeks nominations for Council and committees. In 2017, the GNC reviewed and edited a number of governance policies which were then passed by Council. The Committee also spent considerable time throughout

the year, recruiting members for various committees, including Council.

Council was extremely busy throughout 2017 dealing with a variety of issues and opportunities.

CPM entered into agreements with other physiotherapy regulators to adopt a Harmonized Code of Ethics and Standards of Practice documents. These had been national projects coordinated through the Canadian Alliance of Physiotherapy Regulators (CAPR). The Registrar had been involved in the early stages of this project and members of CPM had opportunities to have input into this project by way of a survey prior to the project being finalized. Another issue that became important over 2017 was Tele-rehabilitation. The Colleges across Canada had developed a Memorandum of Understanding about Tele-Rehabilitation in 2017 which addressed topics such as where does the physiotherapist need to be registered to practice physiotherapy by electronic means, who handles complaints, and which standards of practice apply.

Through the CAPR, discussion was held on the topic of "Is It Physiotherapy?", as there is increasing incidence of non traditional treatment methodologies being introduced into physiotherapy practice. A toolkit was developed to assist practitioners to determine whether a treatment method is or is not physiotherapy. The *Is It Physiotherapy Tool* was posted to the CPM website in 2017.

Council also produced resource material about the use of Social Media. This can be found on the CPM website.

Another topic of concern was the bundling of physiotherapy services. This was beginning to happen across Canada including Manitoba. Of concern to Council was the potential to take financial resources from the public for services not provided.

CPM worked with the Manitoba Association of Registered Respiratory Therapists to negotiate the rental of some of the CPM office space. This has worked out very beneficially to both organizations.

The College began tracking Facebook pages of physiotherapy owned clinics in 2017. Many were found to have testimonials and allowed visitors to "rate the clinic". This type of advertising is against the advertising policies of CPM as it is based on emotions and is not evidence based. Letters were sent to clinics violating the advertising policies and several CPM newsletter articles had information about taking control over these pages.

Recognizing that registration fees have been increasing over the past number of years, Council undertook a project to look at pre-authorized payments. The College of Registered Nurses of Manitoba have been utilizing pre-authorized payments for a number of years and CPM met with them to see what is involved. During 2017, CPM put out a survey to all members to get feedback on pre-authorized payments and what would be involved. The overwhelming response from the membership is that they would not partake in a pre-authorized payment program and so the decision was made to not proceed further with this endeavour.

During the latter part of 2017, CPM worked in conjunction with the College of Rehabilitation Sciences at the University of Manitoba and the Manitoba Physiotherapy Association when the Winnipeg Regional Health Authorities announced the closure of hospital based outpatient physiotherapy departments. As public protection and accessibility to services are mandates of CPM, Council was concerned about the public of Manitoba who would no longer be able to access free physiotherapy services. Collaboration between the three organizations continues into 2018.

The Council struck a Concussion Care Committee to look into physiotherapists providing concussion care to both children, youth and adults. This topic has been a "hot topic" across Canada not only for physiotherapy, but medicine, athletic therapy, chiropractic and others. The Registrars in physiotherapy across Canada have been working on this topic as well. CPM has been in consultation with concussion "experts" within Manitoba. Work continues into 2018 on this subject.

Changes in the definition of physiotherapy would allow them to work at preventative programs and to see healthy people, in consultation with a doctor. This would allow the physiotherapist to assess a pattent's condition before the doctor sees the individual.

registered physiotherapist can practice only under the supervision of a physic-ian. One member of the association said, howver, that "at present, most of

said, nowver, that "at present, most of us break the existing act."
Under the new act, the directors of the association would be expanded to eight members from five. Two would be appointed laymen and the other six would be elected by association members.

The board of the Use of Ms would be licensed to practise in Manitoba.

The association passed a motion requirements until the new act is passed. Under the present act, the maximum registration fee for the association is \$10 a year.

The existing definition says that a siotherapists with degrees from other sounerapists with degrees from other provinces have the educational equivalent of the University of Manitoba physiotherapy degree. Those whose degrees are considered the equivalent of the U of M's would be licensed to practise in Manitoba.


A.P.M.: A Survey of 1957 and 1967

General Introduction


In Winnipeg, On March 30, 1957 An Act respecting the Practice of Physiotherapy was assented to by Her Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba. Thereby, the Association of Physiotherapists of Manitoba, or A.P.M., was created. The same year the first fees were collected. In the following survey, some of the changes that have occurred within the A.P.M. in its first decade are noted. The only signifigant area in which no change is noted is in the area of fees, although the Act permits such a change within limits.

CONTINUING COMPETENCY PROGRAM

The College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba (CPM) in accordance with Part 7 of the *Regulated Health Professions Act_*(RHPA) of Manitoba has developed a Continuing Competency Program (CCP) which consists of three components (Figure 1).

Practice Reflection

The Practice Reflection component of the CCP in place since 2010 consists of Registrants identifying their own two professional learning goals for the coming year and explicitly reflecting on their learning outcomes the following year. All Registrants of CPM are encouraged to participate independently, while 20% of Registrants are requested to submit their learning goals or accomplishment statements electronically for peer review. It is anticipated that participation in this component of the CCP will be a requirement for annual registration once the necessary Regulations are in place and physiotherapists in Manitoba are functioning under the RHPA.

Participation Rates in 2017

163 Registrants from the Active Register were selected for peer review in 2017: 102 to submit Learning Goals and 61 to submit Accomplishment Statements based on the prior year's Learning Goal submissions. This equates to 22% of the active Registrants with the College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba. Three deferrals of participation in the Practice Reflection component of the CCP were requested in 2017, two for reasons of pending retirement and one for a pending maternity leave. Participation rates in the peer review process of both Learning Goal and Accomplishment Statement submissions from 2013-2017 are depicted in Figure 2.



CONTINUING COMPETENCY PROGRAM

Practice Audit

The Practice Audit component of the CCP progressed further in 2017 with the clinical practice audits of 27 individuals and the pilot of a non-clinical practice audit of 4 individuals who use the title of "physiotherapist", for a total of roughly 4% of CPM Registrants. Of those individuals who underwent a clinical practice audit in 2017 the majority were female (81%); practised in an urban community (70%); had been working as a physiotherapist between 10 and 20 years (52%); and worked in either a public practice or mixed funding setting (63%). Of those who underwent a non-clinical practice audit, two worked in a supervisory position of other physiotherapists and two worked in an academic setting.

The majority of the practice audits provided evidence that all practice standards of the College were consistently being met (90%). A small proportion (6%) were identified where a standard of practice was consistently not applied, but no safety concerns were noted. One individual demonstrated two or more professional standards that were not consistently applied to practice and a quality concern was raised requiring ongoing learning or improvement.

Practice Support

The Practice Support component of the CCP was utilized for the first time in 2017, where the Continuing Competence Committee developed an individual learning and improvement plan based on the results of the clinical practice audit. By the end of the year, the requirements for the practice support had been met, including a review of specific practice standards; the development of specific learning goals, and a review of the relevant literature.

Additional Activities

The development of an on-line jurisprudence module that will help Registrants understand the role of self-regulation under the *Regulated Health Professions Act* was completed in 2017 in collaboration with seven other health care regulatory Colleges in Manitoba. It is anticipated that all registrants will be required to complete the module in the future, beginning in 2019.

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Independent Practitioner's Review Engagement Report

To the Members of the College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of the College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba that comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2017, and the statements of operations, fund balances, and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's responsibility for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

Purpose

The College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba is the licensing body for the profession and was incorporated by a special act of the Manitoba Legislature. The College is a not-for-profit organization and is therefore not subject to income taxes.

2. Significant accounting policies

The College applies the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Fund method of accounting

Under the fund method of accounting, the excess of revenues over expenses is allocated to the General Fund and assets acquired are transferred to the Capital Assets Fund.

The General Fund accounts for the College's program and administration activities. Contributions are recognized as revenue of the fund in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

The Capital Assets Fund represents the College's investment in computers, software, office equipment and leasehold improvements. Amortization is recorded as an expense of the Capital Assets Fund.

Financial instruments

The College's financial instruments consist of cash, marketable securities and accounts payable and accrued liabilities. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the company is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments.

A financial asset or liability is recognized when the College becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. The College initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value and, except for securities quoted in an active market, which must be measured at fair value, subsequently measures them at amortized cost. All changes in fair value of the College's investments in securities quoted in an active market are recorded in the statement of operations.

Capital assets

Capital assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization.

Capital assets are amortized over their estimated useful lives at the following rates and methods:

Equipment 20% Declining balance
Computer equipment 20% Declining balance
Computer software 20% Declining balance

Amortization of leasehold improvements is recorded over the remaining term of the lease.

No amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition.

2. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Lease inducement

The College has entered into a lease agreement. The negotiation of the lease agreement included the consideration of incentives, or inducements, for the lessee to sign the lease. The deferred lease inducements are amortized on a straight line basis over the term of the lease, and are included as a reduction of rent expense each year.

Revenue recognition

Registration fees and sundry income are recognized as income in the year to which they relate.

Use of estimates

Management reviews the carrying amounts of items in the financial statements at each balance sheet date to assess the need for revision or any possibility of impairment. Many items in the preparation of these financial statements require management's best estimate. Management determines these estimates based on assumptions that reflect the most probable set of economic conditions and planned courses of action.

These estimates are reviewed periodically and adjustments are made to net income as appropriate in the year they become known.

Contributed services

The work of the College is dependent on the voluntary services contributed by many members. Contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements because of the difficulty in determining their fair value.

Rent

The College leases its premises. Rent expense is recognized on a straight line basis over the term of the related lease agreements.

6. Financial instruments

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or expected future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk.

(i) Currency risk

The College does not have financial instruments denominated in a foreign currency and therefore is not exposed to currency risk.


(ii) Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. Management believes that the College is not exposed to significant interest rate risk arising from its financial instruments.

(iii) Other price risk

Other price risk relates to the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices of securities held. There was no significant change in exposure from the prior year. This risk is managed through diversification of investments across industries.










EMPLOYMENT STATUS: IN-ACTIVE






FOCUS OF PRACTICE: ACTIVE AND EXAM CANDIDATE





