#### Message from the Chair of Council

When I first joined Council in 2008, I did not know what I was getting involved in. At that time, CPM to me basically consisted of just two things: the people that raised registration fees and the people that wrote the "blue binder" (I'm referring to the binder that was given to some of us in physiotherapy school and probably remained on our bookshelf for a long period of time before it was actually opened).

It was only when I started to be involved on Council did I begin to understand what CPM was all about. I had questions about why do fees increase, what is the process of handling complaints, why is the Continuing Competency Program so important, and how do changes to the legislation actually affect our profession. I started to get the answers I wanted. Eventually, my entire view of CPM was changed a few months ago when the following question came up: if we lost the ability to self-regulate, do we know what would happen to our profession in Manitoba? From that point on, I began to appreciate how crucial CPM was.

CPM's mission is to protect the public interest. As members, we do this by way of selfregulation in which we govern our own profession and are accountable for our own conduct. The work required to maintain this status of self-regulation is being performed by our hardworking office staff and by our dedicated members themselves. The review of practice standards, the establishment of the continuing competency program, the development of regulations and by-laws in accordance with the new Regulated Health Professions Act, and the ongoing handling of complaints are just some of the work that is being completed by our own peers and colleagues.

I am thankful to all of the members that have volunteered their time on Council and on all of the various committees. To call you volunteers would be an understatement. You are physiotherapists that are fulfilling your professional obligation and responsibility. The ability to self-regulate is a privilege and to maintain such a privilege requires the continued support and time of committed members like you.

#### About the College

The College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba is a not-for-profit organization dedicated to regulating the practice of physiotherapists in the public interest. Physiotherapists take a comprehensive approach to providing healthcare- the College takes a similar approach to protecting the public. By ensuring that physiotherapists meet educational standards, are competent and endeavour to continually improve the quality of their practice, the College sets the standard for the delivery of safe, effective and ethical physiotherapy services.

#### Vision

The College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba (CPM) serves the public interest by ensuring the ongoing pursuit of excellence in the quality of physiotherapy services in Manitoba. CPM assures the public of a trusted, fair and responsive relationship. The Council educates the membership and government on the value and role of CPM, ensuring safety and promoting the public reputation of CPM. The benefit of strong leadership to the viability of our organization is evident in public confidence in CPM as well as government confidence in our role of protecting the public. Strong leadership has also earned us the respect of the membership and associate organizations.

#### Mission

To protect the public interest by working to continually improve the quality of physiotherapy care for Manitobans.

#### Striving For Excellence

Environmental Analysis

Similarly to all organizations, CPM functions within a dynamic, fast paced environment. To assist in ensuring our accountability to our mandate, while managing change, we are vigilant in two key activities. One activity is to develop a yearly strategic plan to guide our work and to measure our successes and accomplishments. The other area is scanning provincial, national and international trends to consider their potential impact on regulation.

Factors affecting the regular activity of the College in the past year included:

- Participation of the Chair and Registrar in "Vision 2020", held in Ottawa, to discuss the preferred future of physiotherapy in Canada
- Meetings with Human Resources and Skills Development Canada to participate in discussions about new labour mobility requirements.
- CPM participated in a project which looked into all provincial physiotherapy registration categories
- The coming into force, on June 1, 2011 of The *Regulated Health Professions Act*, which signaled to CPM urgency of working on developing new Regulations, deciding on reserved acts and other changes that will be necessary
- Participation on Alliance Committees including:
  - The Evaluation Services Committee which oversees the credentialing and examination activities of the Alliance
  - The Registrar's Committee
  - Chairing the Advisory Group of the Supervision in Regulatory Entry to Practice Matters Project
  - The Continuing Competence Ad Hoc Committee
- Participation on the Council and Board of Physiotherapy Education Accreditation Canada(PEAC, formerly ACCPAP)
- Continued partnered work related to internationally educated physiotherapists. Specifically, this included
  - **1.** Participating on a project related to developing language benchmarks for the profession, in collaboration with the occupational therapists
  - **2.** Participating on an international committee looking at reciprocity of entry requirements between Canada and Australia
- Collaboration with the Office of the Fairness Commissioner (OFC), following the development of a framework for collecting data on internationally educated professionals. The OFC was also piloting a framework for a review of registration criteria and procedures which CPM will become involved with in 2012

#### Environmental Analysis cont'd

Within its mandate and the outlined environment, the College maintained its strategic focus on continuing to build its capacity, to seek opportunities to partner and collaborate and to provide leadership in regulation.

#### **Evidence of Performance**

#### **Professional Conduct**

The College receives complaints, concerns and mandatory reports regarding the practice of physiotherapists. On occasion, the College also receives information suggesting that individuals who are not registered with the College are referring to themselves as physiotherapists or purporting to practice physiotherapy.

Three complaints that were received in 2010 were carried over and completed in 2011.

- Nature of complaint was a breach of the Code of Ethics and standards of practice and billing issues. Two members were ordered to cease and desist certain practices including having clients apply their own ultra-sound and LASER treatments
- 2. Issues of timely communication with client and with the College, record storage. Recommendations to improve practice made to member.
- 3. Issues of miscommunication and billing practices. Member was issued recommendations to improve practice.

In 2011, eight new complaints against members were received. Four of the complaints have been concluded. The other four are forwarded into 2012. The complaints that were completed in 2011 include:

- 1. This was an unsubstantiated complaint which had elements of miscommunication. Complaint was resolved.
- 2. This complaint was sent to investigations for more information. Issues of communication. Complaint was resolved.
- 3. Issue of inappropriate touching. Complaint resolved after apology by member.
- 4. Issue of poor communication. Complaint resolved. Practice advice given to members.

#### Professional Conduct cont'd

In 2011, the Registrar was made aware of three advertising situations where physiotherapy was advertised as being provided by someone other than a College member. Cease and Desist letters were sent to all offending parties. The notification of these advertisements to the Registrar was made by College members.

#### **Evidence of Performance**

#### **Continuing Competence Committee Report**

In 2011 two hundred and one active practicing members were asked to participate in the pilot of the Continuing Competence Program (CCP) in Manitoba. The program consisted of submitting two "Learning Plan Goal sheets" at renewal time for evaluation by the CCP committee. Members were provided with a *Professional Portfolio and Learning Plan Guide* to begin collecting items for a Portfolio, detailed information on setting Learning Goals, links to an online survey about the pilot, and an introduction to the *Activities Tracking* sheet and *Accomplishment Statement* sheets that will be required documents in their Portfolios.

Eighty six percent of the respondents successfully completed the requirements of the CCP (using a standardized evaluation sheet) and received a letter with tips for future reference from the committee.

The pilot allowed the committee to make recommendations, streamline and change some of the internal processes that occur at the College.

Future considerations include:

- Develop an online form and trial prior to December deadline
- A basic content audit to be completed at the time of submission. Online submissions will be linked to renewal and will not be accepted unless all areas on the form are completed.
- A database to be developed to assist with the organization of the Random selection cycle for submissions
- Communication by email about the program beginning in December. To include a reminder in mid- January 2012.
- An ad-hoc committee to be developed to evaluate the Learning Plan Goal Sheets to allow the parent committee (CCC) to continue to further develop the program. (i.e. Practice Audits, Portfolio Audits and discussion of non-clinical members.) Suggestion: Continuing Competence Evaluation Committee –or CCEC.

#### Continuing Competence Report cont'd

• The Chair of the Ad Hoc committee (CCEC) to collect, evaluate and summarize the future submissions and complete a report to the Registrar and Council.

#### **Strategic Direction**

Over the past one to two years, Council has been focused on engaging the profession in regulation. Plans for the upcoming year include:

- Re-designing the Website to increase accessibility and provide a more intuitive interface for users. Plans include adding portals to access educational materials, case studies on ethics, jurisprudence and an online portal for the Continuing Competence Program
- Continuing to send newsletters by e-mail, more frequently to members. This will include a major edition followed by a smaller edition the next issue. A schedule has been developed.
- Working with Manitoba Health as CPM moves towards new legislation
- Working with the Fairness Commissioner to improve our registration information for internationally educated physiotherapists and as part of the registration audit process.
- Development of a program to assist students, the internationally educated and new registrants to transition to professional practice in Manitoba

# COLLEGE OF PHYSIOTHERAPISTS OF MANITOBA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 2011

#### 1. PURPOSE

The College of Physiotherapists of Manitoba is the licensing body for the profession and was incorporated by a special act of the Manitoba legislature. The College is a not-for-profit organization and is therefore not subject to income taxes.

#### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Fund Method of Accounting:**

Under the fund method of accounting, the excess of revenue over expenses is allocated to the General Fund and assets acquired are transferred to the Capital Assets Fund.

The General Fund accounts for the College's program and administration activities. Contributions are recognized as revenue of the fund in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

The Capital Assets Fund represents the College's investment in computers, software, office equipment and leasehold improvements. Amortization is recorded as an expense of the Capital Assets Fund.

#### **Capital Assets:**

Capital assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. Capital assets are amortized over their estimated useful lives at the following rates and methods:

Computers and software	-	20%, declining balance
Office equipment	-	20%, declining balance
Leasehold improvements	-	10%, straight line

No amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition.

#### **Revenue Recognition:**

Registration fees and sundry income are recognized as income in the year to which they relate.

#### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

#### Marketable Securities:

Marketable securities, bonds and short term investments are classified as available-for-sale and their fair value is determined using quoted market bid prices. Changes in the fair value of marketable securities are recorded as unrealized gains and losses and included in other comprehensive income.

#### Measurement Uncertainty:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses. Management believes its estimates to be appropriate; however, actual results could differ from the amounts estimated.

#### **Financial Instruments:**

The College's financial instruments consist of cash, marketable securities and accounts payable and accrued liabilities. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the company is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair values of these financial instruments approximate their carrying values, unless otherwise noted.

#### **Contributed Services:**

The work of the College is dependent on the voluntary services contributed by many members. Contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements because of the difficulty in determining their fair value.

#### **3. MARKETABLE SECURITIES**

The marketable securities are pooled funds managed by The Investors Group. The College is exposed to market risk from fluctuations in the interest rates and the market value of the equities within the fund.

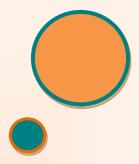
